Chief Executive Officer's Report

As another year goes by, we find ourselves busier than ever.

Requests for information, support and friendship increased, as we dealt with 3,500 community cases, 3,000 enquiries at Reception, 2,200 Social Activity Centre placements and over 10,000 WTN and Magazine publications, not bad for a year's work.



The year did get off to a rocky start, as our contracts with Walsall Council, for the Eye Clinic Liaison Officer (ECLO) and Registration Information and Liaison Officer (RILS), came to an end and were terminated.

Following a re-evaluation by Walsall Council, the contracts went out to tender. This was a position we had never been placed in before, as we had to compete with other organisations, in order to try and win back the contracts.

With support from Helen Smith, for Action for the Blind, we submitted our tender and after a nervous wait, were informed at the beginning of July that we were successful in our application. For the first time the contract was given to us with a guarantee of 3 years, with the possibility to extend to 4 years. A good result!

Feeling confident, we then applied for a new contract to deliver Empowerment, Engagement and Decision Making, unfortunately missing out to the original provider. However, we were not deterred, as we then tendered for the Transcription contract, in which we succeeded, 2 out of 3, we were proud of our success.

The Social Activity Centre continues to thrive thanks to Joanne, Jackie and Janet and their team of dedicated volunteers.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

Through meetings with the Social Activity Representatives each quarter, we have the opportunity to discuss and make suggestions for the Social Activity Centre and plan a timetable of activities through the year. Whilst retaining their autonomy, each group raise their own group funds and each finance their own Christmas activities, buffets, outings and entertainment.

Walsall Talking Newspaper (WTN) and Magazine Service, managed by Keith Corbett, said goodbye to Sharron Wainwright, after 21 years of volunteering for WTN. As we said goodbye to the popular Chatterbox spot from Sharron, we said hello to Reach Out, a new spot created by WTN volunteer Jane, who carried through the transition of both features seamlessly, with Reach Out being well received by our listeners.

Moving forward within the Society, Claire's role of Operational Support Officer has grown, as she has introduced new ventures and services into the Social Activity Centre.

In his role as Community Engagement Officer, Les continues to make and maintain contact throughout the year, with those registered with a sight loss within the Walsall Borough. Ensuring that individuals are safe and well and ascertaining if they are in need of any additional services.

This ongoing support has allowed us to accomplish so much, helping us achieve our mission of providing information, support and friendship through the services we deliver, to those with sight loss, their families and carers across the Borough of Walsall.


We are proud that we continue to provide all of our services, free of charge.

Income

Our total income for the year was £183,679 compared with £182,953 last year. We saw an increase in donations and legacies of £9,331 and a loss of £10,758 when the Befriending and Support grant income ceased.

Income by Source – year to 31 March 2016




We wish to thank all who support the Society and the families of those who donate to us in memory of their loved ones. Thank you to Walsall Council for their continued support.

Expenditure

Costs incurred this year were \pounds 226,553 compared with \pounds 243,529 in the prior year. Salaries form the largest share of our expenditure, which has been reduced again, by \pounds 8,122 compared with the prior year.

Expenditure by cost – year to 31 March 2016




Result for the year

Once again, our expenditure exceeded our income by £42,874, compared with £60,576 last year. Whilst we try to continue to maintain the level of support and guidance we offer to Blind and Partially Sighted individuals, their families and carers, within the Borough of Walsall.

Our investment income, legacies and donations, are used primarily to fund the Social Activity Centre, Talking Newspaper and Magazine Service, Community Support and Transcription Service.

As we have seen, the level of legacies and general donations has not been sufficient, to fully fund all services Walsall Society for the Blind continues to offer, hence the deficit arising for the year.



Income & Expenditure – year to 31 March 2016

Society Assets

The investment income we receive each year, is generated from our investment portfolio and is managed by an independent broker.

The income received represented 42% of our total annual income.

The cost of our investments was consistent at \pounds 1.2 million and were valued at \pounds 1.8 million at the year end.

Society Reserves

We are required to hold sufficient funds to cover between 9 months and 2 years' costs at any time, which we hold in a Development Fund, at £1.2 million.

The closing unrestricted funds for use by the Society, stand at £664,691.

Summary

Whilst there is a continued strain on funding, the Trustees believe that the Society has sufficient funds to continue to support the visually impaired people of Walsall.

The Trustees also express thanks to the Chief Executive Officer and her dedicated team of personnel and volunteers, who have managed to provide continued support in these challenging times.

You do not have to be registered blind or partially sighted to attend our groups and we are also here to help, advise and link you to other services and groups to further grow your network.

Offering a safe, relaxed and welcoming environment, enjoy a hot meal on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays, for just £3.95 per meal. We also have a Tuesday evening ladies group and a group on alternate Thursdays. Transport can be provided care of Ring and Ride at £1- £2 per journey.

With regular entertainment, quizzes, bingo and crafts, there really is something for everyone. So don't miss out, come along and join us.

All our services are free of charge.



Do you have sight loss? Interested in technology, but never used a computer, mobile phone or tablet before?


Maybe you struggle to use different forms of technology or are just experiencing issues and need advice because of failing eye sight.
