Chief Executive Officer's Report

A year of up's and down's



After a successful 18 month pilot project, our Befriending contract came to an end in June 2014. We submitted a tender application for a new project, sadly losing out to a national charity.

The Befriending pilot had many positive outcomes, matching clients with befrienders, many friendships were formed. As the project ended, we were no longer able to make any further matches, however, most importantly as a volunteer led project, the support and friendships already in place continue into the future.

The creation of 2 new posts saw Claire Evans become Operational Support Officer, ensuring smooth service delivery and Les White became Community Engagement Officer, contacting clients, to ensure they are safe and well and aware of the services available.

Walsall Society for the Blind's minibus transport ceased as of the 1st July 2014, with the loss due to redundancy of our 2 drivers Mark Simpson and Pete Wilkinson.

Following the loss of our own transport, clients attending the centre continued to support us. We were approached by Ring & Ride who offered their help, as a replacement transport service. This involved many difficult changes for clients attending the centre, however things have greatly improved overtime and this has been thanks to the great help and assistance of Claire Evans, who organises and manages the Ring & Ride service at WSB.

Ring & Ride transport costs £1.00 per journey daytime and £2.00 per journey in the evening, costs are paid for by the client.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

Our much loved Walsall Talking Newspaper (WTN) and Magazine Service continues to go from strength to strength. Going digital in 2011 opened up a world of material for staff and volunteers to work with. The Talking Newspaper now contains 3 hours of listening per week and the Magazine 12 hours of listening per month.

We have received notification of the termination of our Eye Clinic Liaison Officer (ECLO) and Registration, Information and Liaison Service (RILS) contract. This is of grave concern, as this is our only and last remaining contract with our Local Authority, Walsall Metropolitan Borough Council. We have submitted our Invitation To Tender documents for the contract, with the assistance of Helen Smith from Action For Blind People and now wait to see if we have been successful.

Throughout the year, we have had 2,787 enquiries at reception, dealt with 3,505 community cases, offered 2,390 day places and sent out 9,457 publications of our WTN and Magazine. These services were all made available through our charitable activities. We removed the attendance charge for the Social Activity Centre and have seen an increase in numbers of those attending over the year.

As the year came to an end, we were approached by the amazing Graeme Brookes, who said "I am walking from Walsall to Wembley in memory of my Grandfather Ronald Brookes and would like to raise money for Walsall Society for the Blind at the same time, would that be ok?" Wow, the rest is history, Graeme's fantastic achievement is recorded later on in this review, from page 28.

As always I wish to say a special thanks to all the staff, clients and volunteers who have supported the Society over the past year. Ensuring we continue to help and support those affected by sight loss, their families and carers across the Borough of Walsall.



I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Accounts of the Society.

Income

Our total income for the year was £182,953 compared with £243,445 last year. The reduction in income of £60,000 was due to the lower level of donations, legacies and grant income received.

Income by Source - year to 31 March 2015





We wish to thank all who support the Society and the families of those who donate to us in memory of their loved ones. Thank you to Walsall Council for their support and we will work with them to try to secure funding for future years.

Expenditure

Costs incurred this year were £243,529 compared with £255,029 in the prior year. Salaries form the largest share of our expenditure which has been reduced again, by nearly £20,000 compared with the prior year.

Expenditure by cost – year to 31 March 2015




Result for the year

Once again, our expenditure exceeded our income by £60,576 compared with £11,584 last year.

Further cuts in grant and contract income for 2016 will make our coming year even more challenging.

Our investment income, legacies and donations are used primarily to fund the Social Activities Centre, Transcription Service, Talking Newspaper and Magazine Service and the community support work the Society is able to offer to local residents. As we have seen, the level of legacies and general donations has not been sufficient to fully meet the costs of those activities this year, hence the deficit arising for the year.

Society Assets

The cash and bank balances at the end of the year total £23,401 compared with £31,856 at the start of the year.

The investment income we receive each year is generated from our investment portfolio, managed by an independent broker.

The investment income represents 41% of our annual income. Such income is becoming an increasing proportion of our total income as grants are withdrawn and general donations are on the decline.

The cost of our investments was consistent at £1.3 million and were valued at £2.0 million at the year end.

Society Reserves

We are required to hold sufficient funds to cover between 9 months and 2 years' costs at any time which we hold in a development fund, at £1.2 million.

Restricted funds for use by the Walsall Talking News, stand at £396.

Closing unrestricted funds for use by the Society, stand at £797,261.

Summary

Whilst there is a continued strain on funding, the Trustees believe the Society has sufficient funds to continue to support the visually impaired people of Walsall.

The Trustees also express thanks to the Chief Executive and her dedicated team who have managed to provide support in these challenging times.

Hearing the news that your vision is deteriorating, you have been diagnosed with an eye condition or you are in the process of becoming registered partially sighted or blind, can feel isolating and lonely.

You are not alone

Whenever you need us, our friendly team are here to answer any questions you may have, listen to any worries or concerns and offer you support and assistance. Emotionally you may feel angry, vulnerable, frustrated or confused at this time, we understand those fears and emotions.

Your clear path to sight loss support in Walsall

If you or someone you know is struggling with sight loss, there are many services available to ensure you are well informed, equipped and supported. Over the following pages are some of the services we offer at the Society and some of the possible steps you may take along the sight loss pathway. Whichever step you are at, please be assured that we are here to take each one with you.

Step 1

If you have noticed your vision has changed or you are having any problems with your sight, please make an appointment with an Optician or GP for an initial check up. If necessary they will make a referral for an appointment with a Hospital based Consultant Ophthalmologist.

Step 2

When you meet your Consultant, they will take you through your eye test and diagnosis and discuss if any further treatment or medications are required or if your sight is threatened. Dependant on your diagnosis, if you are eligible, the offer of certification as sight impaired (partially sighted) or severely sight impaired (blind), will be given to you by your Consultant.

Step 3

If you are eligible for certification, the Consultant will complete an official certificate, this is called a **Certificate of Visual Impairment (CVI).** The CVI contains your name, date of birth, address, telephone number and most importantly your visual function and diagnosis.

The Consultant is the only person that can complete your certification. You cannot become registered as visually impaired without it.

A copy of your CVI will be kept in your medical notes, copies will also be sent to your GP, Moorfields Eye Hospital, Walsall Society for the Blind as your local Society and you will receive your own copy through the post.

Offering patients support at the point of diagnosis, in the Eye Clinic at Walsall Manor Hospital, is the Eye Clinic Liaison Officer (ECLO) Janet Porter.

Janet is available to provide emotional support, advocacy and practical information if required, for people coming to terms with news of their eye condition. This early intervention is crucial, as without it many people may leave the Hospital feeling alone, at an extremely confusing time, unaware of the support networks that are available to them. Janet will also provide information about the process of becoming registered as visually impaired.

Step 4

As your local blind Society, when we receive your CVI, our Registration Officer Les White will write to inform you of its receipt.

Being registered as blind or partially sighted is entirely your own decision. If you do choose to become registered you will receive your registration card, which will contain your unique registration number and if you are registered as blind or partially sighted.

Registration can entitle you to certain benefits and concessions such as TV license reductions, parking permits and travel passes and may also make it easier for you to access local services.

Les will contact you by telephone within 5 days, to ask if you would be interested in accessing any of the services we provide. They include our free Talking Newspaper and Magazine Service and our Social Activities Centre where you can enjoy crafts, bingo and quizzes or come along and meet new friends, it is free for you to attend and a warm welcome awaits.

You may feel at this point in time that you are not ready for any contact, advice or services. This again, is entirely your choice.

Les works closely with our Community Officer Dilys and the Sensory Support Team, (Visual Impairment Division of Social Services), you will be offered basic living skills training such as, mobility and kitchen skills. Every new registration in the Borough is

automatically referred to Sensory Support and they will contact you in due course.

Step 5

Offering a vast wealth of knowledge, experience and expertise is our Community Officer Dilys. Dilys offers emotional support, guidance and information to anyone affected by sight loss.

We realise visual impairment not only affects the individual, but their friends, families and carers can be greatly affected too, for any advice Dilys is here to speak with you.

Dilys is available to assist on a whole range of topics, including:

- Welfare Benefits
- * Aids and equipment
- Marking up of equipment
- * Adaptations
- Signpost to relevant agencies and support groups
- Social groups

The Talking News service is free to all blind and partially sighted people within the Walsall Borough.

Our services include a weekly memory stick, packed with local community information, news and special features, it also contains the 'Peoples Friend' magazine and the BBC's publication of 'In Touch'.

Our monthly magazine goes out to all listeners and contains features from Country Living, Readers Digest, BBC Gardeners World, Saga, Which and Choice magazines to name just a few, offering over 10 hours of entertainment.

The club supports you to ensure that you get the most from your sessions. Walsall to Wembley by Graeme Brookes

On March 22nd 2015, Walsall Football Club will end their 127 year wait to make the trip to Wembley. They're facing Bristol City in the final Johnstones Paint Trophy.

My grandfather Ronald 'Ronaldo' Brookes was a life long Walsall FC fan. He watched his first game in 1922. He was there for every relegation to every promotion for 78 years! The thing that made him that extra bit special was... **he was deaf and blind.**

Born deaf and losing his sight as a teenager, he didn't let it beat him and it certainly didn't stop him watching Walsall as much as possible, both home and away.

He would have the game 'typed' on his hand using deaf/blind manual alphabet by his son (my Dad) Paul and then as I got older, by myself too. However he could hear just about enough that when there was a loud cheer and he got vigorously shook - we had scored!

After finally getting to Wembley after

127 years, I felt it only appropriate to do something to represent Ronaldo and make his presence known on Walsall FC's day of days. This is why I am walking 20 miles a day for around 7 ½ consecutive days until I walk down Wembley Way, on Sunday March 22nd to watch the Super Saddlers.

Due to Ronaldo's condition, he did need help and support throughout his life, particularly in his formative years and being a Walsall man his entire life, he received this from Walsall Society for the Blind.

Therefore to honour my grandfather and his love for Walsall FC and combine it to help raise as much money as possible for charity. I can honour his legacy by supporting a charity and by supporting the football club he loved the most!

Graeme's Journey

In the weeks before starting his journey, we had the pleasure of spending time with Graeme and his Father, when they visited the Society. They met with friends, sharing many happy memories and stories of when Ronald attended Walsall Society for the Blind.

Graeme started his journey on Saturday March 14th, from the half way line at half time, between the Walsall FC and MK Dons match at Banks's Stadium. To rapturous applause and cheers he spoke of his Grandfather, Walsall Society for the Blind and his journey to come.

Over the next 7 ½ days he walked **143.2 miles**, through rain, sunshine and even an eclipse, to reach Wembley.
